Encouraged to apply for grants by a spokesman from the Heritage Lottery Fund, an application to cover next year's exhibitions, etc is now under consideration.

FUTURE PROGRAMME



NOTICE OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting of the Society will be held on Wednesday October 15th 2008 at 7.30 p.m. at the Guild House to receive the Society's accounts and elect officers and trustees.

Nominations should be signed by the nominee, a proposer and a seconder, all of whom must be members of the Society. Nominations should reach the Secretary at 23 Blackdown Road, Knowle B93 9HP by <u>October 1st.</u> The present officers and committee must all retire at the AGM, but are eligible for re-election and are willing to continue in office.

It would be helpful if any member wishing to propose amendments to the rules or any other motion would let the secretary know by the same date.

ADMINISTRATION

The Society is currently considering applying for Gift Aid. HM Inland Revenue has confirmed that we do not need to be a registered charity to be eligible. *However*, at present non-members are changed an entrance fee of £1.50 to meetings. With three per year the Revenue regards this as an annual benefit to members of £4.50; but to be eligible for Gift Aid benefits must not exceed 25% of the subscription. *An alteration to the rules is therefore needed* to allow free entrance to everyone. We can then ask non-members for a donation, which the Revenue does not count.

PROJECTS GROUP

For those who want to take an active part in the Society a small projects group was set up at the beginning of 2008 under the leadership of John Johnson. The group undertakes research, record transcription etc. Two members are currently in the final stages of preparing an exhibition and are also setting up a database of information on Knowle families. Other projects in hand include research into Copt Heath windmill and Grimshaw Castle. TALKS & SOCIAL EVENTS

The Society's programme of talks is for the enjoyment of members, but also informs the public about the history of the village in an informal way, from which we hope both long-standing residents and newcomers can benefit. There have been three talks this year, all given by members of the Society. The first was on *Kixley Lane* in October, given by Elaine Warner and greatly enhanced by contributions from the audience. This was followed in March by *The History of Wroxall Abbey*, a new talk by Mrs. Beryl Ellerslie, and the Revd. Dr. Anthony Upton speaking on *Knowle History from National and Local Sources* in May. All the talks have been well attended, attracting up to 70 people. Members appear to prefer the Guild House as a venue to the church, with many taking advantage of the coffee facilities.

Social events have included a Christmas social and a strawberry tea at Wroxall Abbey in beautiful weather in July, when we were able to wander around at will, with Mrs. Beryl Ellerslie and Dr. Colin Harris as guides.

IMAGE LIBRARY & OTHER RECORDS

Many photographs have been added to the image library, mostly obtained for exhibitions and talks. Images have been scanned, enhanced and stored in suitable formats by Geoffrey Dean. The oral history records contain a wealth of information which can only be obtained from long-standing residents. Excerpts bring exhibitions and talks alive - several are included in *The Railway Station*. This is an on-going programme of new interviews and typing existing ones, co-ordinated by Sylvia Moody.
