FINANCE, ADMINISTRATION & MEMBERSHIP, ETC

You will find the minutes of the last AGM enclosed. Both these and this report will be taken as read., and the accounts will be available at the meeting. We operate on a very tight budget, comprising subscription income, together with donations at meetings and from outside talks. We are pleased to have ended the year with a small surplus, especially as we are still at the stage of acquiring essential equipment. This year we have partly paid for the sound system (already mentioned) and some small exhibition boards for use at Solihull Library, made very economically by Sylvia Moody.

We have now designed a gift aid form for existing members, which you will find enclosed. If you pay tax it would be helpful if you would allow us to claim this benefit. There is also a new membership form incorporating a Gift Aid Declaration. This completes the literature we need to apply to HMRC for registration.

Membership has increased from 113 last year to 138. This figure includes two honorary members: one in Australia, from whom it is difficult to collect a subscription, and Mrs. Eunice Lippiatt (née White), in acknowledgement of her generous gift of her postcard album. We also have one corporate member. It was encouraging that only a very few people did not renew their membership at the beginning of the year.

FUTURE PROGRAMME

The talks and social programme will follow the usual pattern in 2010, with the first event following the AGM on October 21st, when there will be a panel of speakers recalling their childhood in Knowle, illustrated by slides from the image library. Audience participation will be welcome. As this is likely to be very popular do we want to issue (free) tickets? We hope to see many of you at the Christmas Social at the British Legion in December the call notice is enclosed.



The March talk will be on the history of Hampton-in-Arden, given by Mike Bryant. In May we have the Master of the Lord Leycester Hospital at Warwick followed by a visit in July. Some of you may know the hospital has connections with Knowle. The October talk will be kept in-house as usual, and is still to be decided. One of next year's exhibition will be the history of Lyons' butcher's shop, prepared by John Lyons. The summer exhibition will be on ???? (title to be decided) and there will be another for Heritage Open Days in September 2010. Girl Guides ?Further suggestions are always welcome.

We hope you enjoy your membership of the Society and look forward to seeing you soon. The next newsletter will be circulated in February 2010.
