to incorporate our catalogue into the library system, using an industry standard package. We would then be compatible with both Solihull and Warwick at no cost to the Society. If this can be made to work it would be the ideal solution. We are very grateful to the library staff for this suggestion. Transporting a database from one platform to another is always complex. With luck, our present professional (but ancient) developer's package should cope with any necessary reformatting.

DIGITAL RECORDS

The Society's projects - its visible presence - clearly need well-organised data behind them, a matter to which the Exhibitions Group will give some priority.

PUBLICATIONS

Pressure of work has made it impossible to publish The Canal Through Knowle until now; it will be completed as soon as possible. Existing publications still sell well.

OUTSIDE EVENTS

Several outside talks have been given during the year; however, there was no talk for Adult Learners' Week. We provided guides at Knowle Parish Church for Heritage Open Days and will do so again this year; Growing Up In Knowle for Solihull Talking Magazine was completed in January; a small exhibition for Oxfam Books & Music was on show in July. Knowle C of E Primary Academy Year 6 Local History

Project took place as usual, but a new curriculum means changes next year. Unfortunately Knowle Festival in the Park was cancelled this year; we wish the Friends of Knowle Park better luck with volunteers in 2014; we were disappointed that there was no room for us at Barston Fete, which we have attended for the last few years, with a lot of interest in our stall. Four bookings for talks for the next year



have already been received; more will probably follow. Golden End Cottage, 1853

FINANCE, ADMINISTRATION & MEMBERSHIP

The Society's administration has been in the capable hands of the Secretary and the Treasurer; finances are in good shape and the Society is in a position to purchase a certain amount of necessary equipment and still maintain a reasonable reserve. Membership stands at 173 - larger than most local history societies, despite a not unexpected slight drop from 182. The minutes of the last AGM are enclosed; both these and this report will be taken as read; the accounts will be available at the AGM.

EXHIBITIONS

Exhibitions have been mainly topical, starting with Knowle Local History Society ~ The First Five Years in September. The 600th anniversary of the Guild of Knowle in February was an obvious subject for the Spring exhibition. After an extended presence in the church and Guild House, for which the Society thanks Knowle Parish Church, a fortnight in Oxfam Books & Music followed in July. The exhibition is now at Solihull Library. Johnson's Garage was shown in March as a tribute to the late John Johnson. The first appearance of Eva Wootton ~ Her Life & Legacy was scheduled for Knowle Festival in the Park, which was unfortunately cancelled; it will be at Knowle Library in November as advertised. Knowle Celebrations and Knowle & The Crown - both first seen at the Jubilee exhibition last year - were recently shown at Solihull Library, a shorter interval between viewings at Knowle and Solihull, as they were still topical. The Westminster Connection followed at Solihull, a natural subject before the present Guild exhibition. Far End will be on show for Heritage Open



Days, but may be over before this newsletter is distributed. Far End is a two-hundred year old house in Kixley Lane, associated, among others, with the Willcox family. Research for this has been lengthy, as the Willcox's are a large and widespread clan, difficult to sort out. However, enough research has been done to cover any future exhibition on Grimshaw Hall, which they owned in the 19th century. We are grateful to those associated with Far End for their help. IMAGE LIBRARY
