purpose. If you would like to take advantage of this, send us an email telling us which project you want (excluding those for which there is a booklet and only one or two at a time - space is limited); we will then upload the relevant files and send you a confidential link. Material will be taken down after a time if space becomes critical. A list of past projects can be found on the Society web site at www.knowlehistory.org.uk/research/pastprojects.html. Some of the early ones may need too much alteration, but most should be suitable. This is a service for members only. At present it will be restricted to those with Internet access; but if proved workable we will consider if it can be extended to those without.

WEB SITE

At long last some progress has been made on expanding the web site to include a People & Places section, using material from *The Old Village* talks. After a lot of homework and several experiments, technical difficulties in dividing the site into manageable sized chunks have been resolved more easily than feared. Moreover, the

site can still be put on to a disk, making it available when we have no Internet access - an unexpected bonus. A small sub-committee has been formed to handle this. The committee is in favour of including only limited information, but it will still run to many more pages than the twenty-five on the site at present. It is quite a long job, so information may be uploaded gradually.

PUBLICATIONS

Bowling in Knowle was published in November - not in the plan, but sparked off by a comment from Kate Woodcock, who sold fifteen copies to members of the Bowling Club. The other booklets still sell well: one recent order came from a bookshop in Hove, which wanted two copies of each. The next one will be *The Berrow Inheritance*, planned to be available at the talk in February, but which may be put back due to the early date for the first exhibition at Solihull Library.

OUTSIDE EVENTS

Three regular events took place in 2015, which we hope will be repeated this year. The Society provided guides at Knowle Parish Church for Heritage Open Days in September and took a stall at Dorridge Day the same weekend. In November members and others assisted Knowle Primary Academy (Year 6) with their World War 2 project by recounting their memories (or those of their parents) to very attentive and well-behaved children. A well-earned cup of tea afterwards allowed us to talk to the staff and exchange experiences of the afternoon with each other.

We hope you enjoy your membership of the Society and look forward to seeing you soon.

FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION

At the AGM in October the officers and committee were re-elected. We are delighted to welcome Heath Pratt, who was elected for the first time. Those present will know that the Society's finances are healthy, with a closing balance of £543.33. As the treasurer explained, the loss of £859.25 is accounted for by the purchase of equipment, the major item being the repayment of £975 for the projector, which we have paid out of income. Stock, plus an estimated amount for unclaimed Gift Aid, gives total assets of just over £780.

Many thanks to those who have renewed your membership. Those who haven't will receive a telephone call from the secretary. We hope you wish to continue as members, but *please* pay your subscription. Membership remains at about 160.

The Society is about to form a new Archives Sub-committee (see below), which will be appointed after one or two informal meetings. This seemed the right moment to give the existing Exhibitions Group its proper status as a sub-committee, rather than the informal group it has been hitherto.

MEETINGS & SOCIAL EVENTS

After the AGM Andrew Bryson gave a talk on *Bowling in Knowle*, at which we were pleased to welcome about twenty members of Ye Olde Knowle Bowling Club. In November a lamentably small audience (the weather?) heard Tony Gulliman speak on *Charlecote House*. Without notes or visual aids he kept us riveted.

Details of the 2016 programme are on the fixture card. The first talk this year will be *The Berrow Inheritance* in February, which will cover the history of the Berrow Cottage Homes Trust from 1885 to the present; it will include William Berrow's sixty acre estate. In April we welcome Jan Cooper from Kenilworth Historical and Archaeological Society for what promises to be an interesting talk entitled *War & Worship: Castle & Church*. We made contact with Kenilworth last year, when we gave



a talk at one of their meetings. The spring lunch will take place in March as usual (call notice enclosed); but the summer meeting will take the form of a light buffet supper at the Guild House, with a slide show, probably showing the 1890s collection of photographs, which members requested last year. We hope the change meets with approval.

EXHIBITIONS

TALKS & GUIDED WALKS

The Society already has ten outside talks booked for 2016, with more likely. They are on the fixture card; but as most of the organizations concerned welcome visitors they are now also advertised in *Knowle Parish Magazine* and listed at www.knowlehistory.org.uk/society/programme.html/#OutsideEvents (case sensitive). *The Canal Through Knowle*, first given last year, is becoming popular. *The Railway Station*, due in October, may prove likewise.

Most of our talks have now been reduced to forty-five minutes in length. With one request for a half hour talk in June attention has now turned to dividing *The Old Village* into separate short talks, starting with *A Walk Along High Street*, updated with new photographs. The same material will be used in the exhibition at Solihull Library (see above) and also in the People & Places section of the web site (see below).

THE IMAGE LIBRARY & DIGITAL RECORDS

A new sub-committee will shortly be appointed to administer the Society's digital records, which are continually increasing. It will handle the image library, photo restoration, a review of file formats and folder structure, numbering and listing, oral history, backing up and possibly DVD production. It needs a small team of people who are comfortable with numbering systems, good at organizing data and



reasonably computer literate. It will be started by Diane Jones and Elaine Warner, who have already had a preliminary meeting. We are agreed that this is a complex subject needing a plan - still to be formulated, but it will doubtless evolve. A number of people have already volunteered; more are welcome.
