FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION

At the AGM in October the officers and committee were re-elected with no changes. Those present will know that the Society had an excess of income over expenditure of £384.86, with a closing balance at the bank of £898.19. An estimated £200 for unclaimed Gift Aid plus stock in hand brings total assets at Year End 31st August 2016 to £1230.49.

During the year the Exhibitions Committee was given its well deserved status and formerly constituted; procedures to administer all sub-committees were agreed at the AGM and inserted into the Society rules (which are effectively part of the constitution). The long-planned Archives Sub-committee is still to be formed. This has become very urgent; preliminary discussions have now started. As said previously, we need a small team of people; one or two have already volunteered, but we shall more, some of whom need to be computer literate - but anyone who can handle a numbering system would be welcome. The committee has also discussed storage space, as there is not another cubic inch left in the chairman's study.

Many thanks to those who have renewed your membership. Those who haven't will receive a telephone call from the secretary. We hope you wish to continue as members, but *please* pay your subscription. Membership stands at 141, with some subscriptions still outstanding.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

At the suggestion of a member at the AGM it was agreed by all that the Society should put a wreath on the cenotaph in November. It was too late for 2016, as we need to design a centre of the right size. We shall be contacting Knowle British Legion in good time for details of how to proceed.

MEETINGS & SOCIAL EVENTS

After the AGM Valerie Morton gave a talk on *The Railway Station*, followed in November by Graham Ibbitson on *The Knights Templar*, which included a section on the crusades. Details of the 2017 programme are on the fixture card. The first talk this year will be *The Farms of Knowle* in February, of which more below. In April we



welcome the excellent Dr. Sylvia Pinches for what promises to be an interesting talk on Compton Verney, which many members may have visited. The two social events will take the same form as in 2016: the spring lunch will be in March as usual (call notice enclosed); the summer meeting will once more take the form of a light buffet supper at the Guild House, with a slide show.

EXHIBITIONS, TALKS AND PUBLICATIONS

Two successful exhibitions were held in the autumn: A Walk Along High Street at Knowle Parish Church for Heritage Open Days in September and The Railway Station at Knowle Library in November. This year starts with a talk on The Farms of Knowle in February, followed by an associated exhibition in April. At Solihull Library The Place Names of Knowle, deferred from last year, will now be shown for two months (and

possibly longer) beginning in April. Until after the Second World War Knowle was essentially a farming village, with numerous farms of all sizes together with supporting businesses such as saddlers and wheelwrights. *The Farms of Knowle* is a very big subject, first shown as an exhibition on ten large boards in 1991 - much too big for the six smaller boards we use today. The Exhibitions Committee proposes to split it into two or more parts, starting with the farms in the centre of the village, including the 15th century Knowle Lodge.

The talk at the summer buffet will be *Woodward's Knowle*, based on a collection of photographs taken, developed and printed in the early 20th century by Mr. Woodward of Hillcrest in Widney Road . Our talks are still much in demand from other organizations: nine are already fixed for 2017 with others under discussion. You will find them listed on the fixture card, on the web site and in *Knowle Parish Magazine*, as well as on posters round the village. Visitors are welcome at many of them. The programme for 2017 is ambitious; it may be necessary to amend it. Time pressures have meant that we are falling behind with booklets. Printing existing ones is not a problem, but new ones take considerable time. That on the Berrow Homes is still at editing stage; whilst we hope to produce more they may have to be put on the back burner.
