main disk had packed up (it hadn't - Windows was in a twist). It did, however, bring forcefully to notice that retrieving it by existing methods would be a big hassle. The chairman has therefore bought another 1TB drive (the new red Toshiba), which will be identical with the main drive (the black Toshiba). For practical reasons these are both the personal property of the chairman. Regrettably they contain personal data as well as the Society database - bad practice, but we do not leave the database in an empty house; there is a limit to how many drives the chairman can put in a handbag. In view of recent problems with ransom ware one wonders if it would be wise to disconnect drives when not in use.

WEB SITE

After good progress on the People & Places section earlier in the year, other projects have got in the way of further action. We still hope to have something on line by the end of the summer.

The Farms of Knowle in February was the first talk in 2017, followed by the excellent Dr. Sylvia Pinches, who spoke on Compton Verney in April. The spring lunch was enjoyed by those who attended. The next event is the summer buffet (call notice enclosed), which will once more take the form of a light buffet supper at the Guild House, with a slide show entitled Woodward's Knowle (see below).

TALKS, EXHIBITIONS & PUBLICATIONS

The Farms of Knowle talk in February went down well, bringing back memories for many in the audience. An associated exhibition followed in April. Unsurprisingly for an agricultural village, it is a large subject, which needs to be divided into several sections: the February talk covered farms in the centre of the village; More Knowle



Farms and Farming Life in Knowle seem to be the natural successors. The Exhibitions Committee is now working on the talk at the summer buffet, which will be Woodward's Knowle, based on a collection of photographs taken, developed and printed in the early 20th century by Frank Woodward of Hillcrest in Widney Road (grandfather of Piers Milne). selection, probably opting for those which are seen infrequently. Many thanks to Piers, whom we hope will say a few words.

The present exhibition at Solihull (Local Studies Dept, 1st Floor) is *The Place Names of Knowle*, which will be on show until June 6th (and possibly longer).



There have already been seven talks to other organizations in 2017, with a further seven to come this year and two already booked for 2018. Those where visitors may be welcome are advertised in *Knowle Parish Magazine* and on posters round the village.

At Solihull Library three show cases are now available instead of two, meaning that exhibitions will not have to be cut down, making life very much easier when transferring from the main boards. The Society has enough boards for one exhibition to be prepared whilst a previous one is in place, but it leaves us short for other events. The Exhibitions Committee needs to streamline work and make life as easy as possible. The Society has therefore acquired six lightweight boards (two sets of three) at a cost of £146, which will also replace the home-made ones used at general meetings. They are the same size as those we use at Knowle Library. Like all the Society's boards they have been purchased from Marler Haley, who have always given us excellent service. They will be seen at Oxfam Books & Music in July and then at the AGM in October. Those who do the arithmetic will notice that this and more archive boxes (see below) will make a large hole in the Gift Aid money.

ARCHIVES & DIGITAL RECORDS

The archives continue to grow, with hard copy making housing it difficult; more blue boxes are needed. An initial meeting has been fixed for May 31st to make a start on sorting things out. This will be all hands on deck: we shall go through the boxes, make a rudimentary list and an assessment of what needs scanning before lodging at Solihull Library. The necessary paperwork is already designed. For those with a

natural bent, this is an enjoyable job (but not quick). Anyone interested in helping please contact me.

Like all filling systems the Society's database needs occasional re-organising. The time has come, spurred by a belief that the
