ARCHIVES

After her retirement Jean Powrie (see People above) did a huge amount of research on the Knowle Hall Estate, on which she wrote four books. Her daughter, Jessie Moorhouse, has kindly given the remaining stock to the Society, together with some research notes, another copy of Canon Downing's Records of Knowle and a small album with photographs of Maurice Worthington at Springfield Farm. We also have permission to use Jean's slides from her talk on Queen Eleanor of Castile, which Geoffrey Dean scanned for her a few years ago. In a separate issue, there is a move afoot for local history societies in the borough to co-operate with Solihull Library on access to material and data. This is an excellent idea, at present at a very early stage.

WEB SITE & CLOUD

At long last the initial stage of the People & Places section of the web site is on line. There are only twenty four pages at present; information is to hand for many more entries, which will be added as time permits. It is a major innovation. If anyone has an interest in a particular place or person and would like us to upload, please let us know and we will push it to the top of the list. There are no on line resources on the site yet, as some explanatory pages are still to be written

The usual crop of enquiries has included one from the team restoring the Burne Jones windows at Birmingham Cathedral, which were given by the Wilkes family, who were related to the Bowers of Knowle Lodge. After putting them in touch with David Bower we both attended a coffee morning with an interesting presentation.

The Junior School Second World War project took place on March 12th as reported in the last newsletter. In April the Society was very pleased to take part in Barston History Weekend, which reminded us of our own first exhibition in 1977. We hope Barston will build on this success as we have done, and that it will be a catalyst for future cooperation. We shall attend Barston Fete on August 27th for the first time for several years with the Images of Barston exhibition. Cottage in Hob Lane (demolished 1930s) September 8th is Heritage Open Days;



EXHIBITIONS, TALKS AND PUBLICATIONS

The Society's talk on Farming Life in Knowle in April went down well. After careful thought and comments from members this huge subject was confined to two projects rather than three. Farming Life in Knowle therefore included the outlying farms, to which it did not do justice, but nevertheless it is considered to have been the right decision. An associated exhibition followed; concerns that there was too much

material to fit on the boards proved unfounded. In April the Society was asked to attend the first Barston History Weekend (see Outside Events below), for which we produced a small exhibition called simply *Images of Barston*. There was not a lot of material, but it looked well. At Solihull *Knowle in the Horse Age* remains until June 4th, to be followed immediately by *Knowle on Wheels*. Both were seen for a very short time

a few years ago (under different titles). Knowle in the Horse Age starts with travelling to and from Knowle in the medieval period, continues to canal horses, farm horses, inns and coaching, tradesmen's horses, taxis and couriers, the hunt etc. It ends with Riding for the Disabled. Knowle on Wheels takes us into the era of bikes and motor transport - and roller skates.





The Exhibitions Committee is now working on forthcoming projects. First is The Lippiatt Collection, for the summer buffet, based on an album of over 200 postcards and photographs donated by the late Eunice Lippiatt. Only those with no duplicates or which are very rarely seen will make the cut. The Old Parsonage will get another airing in the shop window at Oxfam Books & Music in July/August. This time, aided by new boards, it can be complete, with the first four boards visible from the street and the final two from inside. Along Station Road and Lodge Road follows for Heritage Open Days in September and The Wilson Arms (talk only) for the AGM in October. The latter excepted, these all take place before the next newsletter. See Knowle Parish Magazine and posters round the village for further details. With exhibitions here there and everywhere, there was a need for more boards, which are proving necessary, despite depleting the coffers. We now have fifteen of the new lightweight boards, providing twelve for two exhibitions simultaneously and a further



three for the Society display. Some proper soft carry bags have also been purchased, which has made transport a very great deal easier.

Since January a number of talks have been given to other organizations; but we are still falling behind with printing booklets; a mismatch between the printer and the screen colours is still to be resolved.
