OUTSIDE EVENTS

There were more outside events than usual in 2017/18, some of which may become a regular part of the programme. The Society provided guides at Knowle Parish Church for Heritage Open Days in September 2017. The Kenilworth Road exhibition attracted interest and we hope enhanced the Church's own event. The Junior School project took the same form as last year, with a group of members and others interviewed by Year 6 pupils on the Second World War. In October the

Society took a stall at Warwick Words Local History Fair for the second year, when we renewed contact with members of other Warwickshire local history societies. Another first came in November, when the Society laid a wreath at the cenotaph outside the church. Many thanks to Neil McDougall, who laid it, complete with medals earned as a regular soldier. April saw us at Barston Local History Weekend, with the Images of Barston exhibition. The last outside event of 2017/18 was Barston Fete on August Bank



Holiday Monday, to which we were invited after an absence of several years. Our gazebo was full for most of the afternoon; the Lippiatt Album, always a big draw,



attracted constant attention; the computer was used by several people. The Society was pleased to attend both these occasions at Barston, at which we made more local contacts. Our talks are still much in demand from other organizations: eight were given in the year 2017/2018, with several already booked for 2018/19. Doubtless there will be more.

Publicity has taken its usual form, although we are still not using the television at the library. Organizing the files to optimize the work involved will take some thought. Although no articles have been written for *Our Warwickshire*, entries on the web site can be linked to the OW site. The minutes of the last AGM are enclosed; both these and this report will be taken as read; the accounts will be available at the AGM.

Canon Michael Parker has taken his last service after twenty years as Vicar of Knowle. We thank Michael for all he has done for the Church and the village and wish him and his family the very best for the future. And another change: at Oxfam Books & Music Sue Eagle, who has been the manager since it opened, has retired. We owe Sue a great deal, as Oxfam sell our publications for us, allow us to put exhibitions in the shop window and are generally very good to us. We wish Sue the very best for the future. We extend a very warm welcome to the new manager, Kathryn Jones, who happens to be a history graduate. We look forward to a continuation of the good relationship we have always enjoyed with Oxfam.

MEETINGS & SOCIAL EVENTS

The 2017/18 programme followed the usual format, with two talks on Knowle with in-house speakers and two with outside speakers. Diary constraints caused the first in-house talk to be in April rather than February, which was better for the

Exhibitions Committee, several of whom are on holiday in February. Preparation also clashes with that of the January newsletter. Both the in-house talks were in the evening, but it is the easiest option. Outside speakers were Jan Cooper on *John of Gaunt*, who proved to be a popular subject, with several people making a special effort to come. Nick Holmes spoke on *The Canals of Lapworth & Rowington* in April. The Spring Lunch was again an enjoyable occasion for those who wish to come; the Summer Buffet at the Guild House is now an established part of the programme.

EXHIBITIONS, TALKS AND PUBLICATIONS

The two main projects were *The White Swan & The Red Lion* in Autumn 2017 and *The Outlying Farms & Farming Life* in Spring 2018. Both included a talk and an exhibition. The *Farming Life* talk and exhibition and the previous year's *The Knowle Farms* need some thought as to whether the split between the two is right. The talk at the summer buffet this year was *The Lippiatt Collection*, featuring a selection of photographs from the album donated by the late Eunice Lippiatt. No more booklets have been published and time for printing existing ones is still hard to find. *Knowle at*

Christmas and *Knowle in the Snow*, timed to coincide with the switching on of the Christmas lights in late November 2017 were innovations at Oxfam, although there was no exhibition at Oxfam this summer. Two exhibitions were prepared for outside events (see below): *Kenihvorth Road* for Heritage Open Days was a virtual tour from the church to Temple Balsall, passing through the original medieval village. *Images of Barston* was mounted for events in Barston.
