Membership currently stands at 141. **We need help with finance.** If anyone has any experience in this field (not necessarily professionally) and can spare a little time, please contact us. It is not very arduous: we felt that the start of this financial year was the right time to move to computerised ledgers (meaning getting to grips with Microsoft Excel). The accounts are done by some friendly chartered accountants.

TALKS & SOCIAL EVENTS

After *Growing Up in Knowle* in October, the Christmas Social took place as usual in the first week in December. For probably a variety of reasons it was not as well-attended as usual and we cancelled our booking at Knowle British Legion in favour of Meg Hole's house. Those who came had an enjoyable evening - and at less cost. Many thanks to Meg for having us and to both Meg and Sylvia Moody for organising the food.

On January 20th Valerie Morton gave a talk on *The History of Springfield House*. It outlined the history of Springfield as a private house from the early 18th century to 1941 and the function of the stables as a hospital in the Great War. It ended with a short description of its present use as a school for children with special needs, the nature reserve and the environmental study centre. This was our first afternoon meeting, and attracted an audience of nearly seventy - far more than we expected, as notice was short and circulated by various means. We shall probably do the same in 2011, but in February rather than January.

The next talk will be given by Mike Bryant on *The History of Hampton-in-Arden*, of which, of course Knowle was once part. Mr. Bryant has been involved with the history of Hampton for a number of years.

The subject of the May talk will be *The Lord Leicester Hospital* at Warwick, with which the village has connections. As you may know, the Manor of Knowle was once owned by the Earl of Leicester and the hospital received our Great Tithes. The speaker will be the Master, Lt. Col. G. Lesinski, who is in great demand (we booked two years ago). There will be an afternoon visit to the hospital, with tea, in July.

We should perhaps mention that a number of people have seen some of the images on the screen at various times and have expressed a wish for a slide show. We are pleased to tell you that Ros Croft will be showing some slides, with commentary, at the AGM in October, at which audience participation will be welcome.

EXHIBITIONS

This year's exhibition programme includes our usual three exhibitions in April, June and September. First comes *Guiding in Knowle ~ The First Ninety Years*, which title is self-explanatory.
