## **FINANCE, ADMINISTRATION & MEMBERSHIP, ETC**

The minutes of the last AGM are enclosed. Both these and this report will be taken as read, and the accounts will be available at the AGM. The Society continues to operate on a very tight budget, comprising subscription income plus donations at meetings, from outside talks and other sources. Profit from publications has produced a higher surplus than last year, but we still need to build up reserves. We are about to apply to HM Revenue & Customs for Gift Aid registration. Membership has increased from 138 last year to 143. The conversion of our web site to new software has produced an increasing number of enquiries, and it is now registered with *Google Analytics*, which tells us how many visitors we have and how they find us.

## **FUTURE PROGRAMME**

Following a short AGM on October 20th Roslyn Croft will be giving an illustrated talk based on old photographs of Knowle. *Audience participation will be welcome at the end of the evening.* We hope to see many of you then and at the Autumn Luncheon at the Wilson Arms - the call notice is enclosed. ## NOTICE OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

## TALKS & SOCIAL EVENTS

There have been four public talks this year, starting in October with *Growing Up in Knowle*, a forum-style evening from which emerged the series of leaflets on seasonal memories which have been distributed with the newsletter - the latest one is enclosed. The Christmas Social in December was held at Meg Hole's house, as the cost of the Jubilee Room at Knowle British Legion is now prohibitive. An additional meeting,

held in the afternoon in January on *The History of Springfield House*, proved popular. Others have been on *The History of Hampton-in-Arden*, followed by an entertaining talk on the history of the Lord Leycester Hospital at Warwick by the Master. Twenty members and guests enjoyed a visit to this wonderful medieval building in July, with a guided tour and an excellent tea. We hope members have appreciated the sound system: after a few initial squeaks it has worked well, even in a larger hall for which it was not designed.

## EXHIBITIONS

September 2009 saw *Six Knowle Buildings* on display for Heritage Open Days - now under the auspices of *English Heritage*. *Guiding in Knowle ~ The First Ninety Years* followed in May. The main summer exhibition was *The Horseless Carriage*, the last in our series on the transport theme. Following a now established tradition it had its first public viewing at Knowle Festival, a second at Springfield House Fayre and another at Barston Fete. It will finish at Knowle Library in November and eventually be shown at Solihull Library. Once more the Society provided a small exhibition for the Oxfam

## PUBLICATIONS

With *Springfield Hall, A Country House in Knowle* the Society made its first foray into publishing. Although we have produced small leaflets (printed on a home computer) this is our first professionally produced booklet. It has been far more successful than we dared hope, and more are planned for 2010/2011. We use a very good printer, which specialises in local history publications. It may be worth mentioning that the copyright of the text of anything the Society publishes *belongs to the authors*. The same applies to photographs.

## IMAGE LIBRARY & OTHER RECORDS

Additions to the image library are normally acquired when preparing exhibitions, for which the Society approaches Knowle residents who may have suitable material. Many thanks to members who have donated material or lent their personal photographs for scanning. We have continued to collect modern sale particulars if they provide details of historic buildings. Images aside, we have a number of 'hard copy' items for which we lack suitable storage. Several of these have now been lodged at Solihull Central Library, where they are stored in controlled conditions. They are on deposit, rather than donated, and can be retrieved at any time.

## ORAL HISTORY
